Two Postcards that Changed My Destiny.

I was never good at English in school, nor interested in anything overseas but when I was in my 20s, I received two

postcards that changed my life. One was an info-session for overseas travel. With that, I went to Australia, and I met an older man that had a huge impact on my life. Thanks to him, I fell in love with Australia. He also taught me what it really meant to communicate with other people. At that time, I didn't have the ability to fully express my gratitude to him, which made me realise I wanted to study more English.

The other was a book survey postcard. I was still interested in Australia, so I bought a book about Working-Holidays experiences. Inside was a survey postcard. I was almost too old for the program, and I replied to their postcard telling them exactly that. They responded and encouraged me to apply anyway. With that, I returned to Australia for a year and a half. I travelled, studied English, and worked at a few places, including a duty-free shop, selling high-end watches to travellers. I had a blast.

I can thank that old man I met on my first trip for my lifelong love of International Exchange.

The Next Step: 'International Exchange' and AWIA

Going overseas opened my world. It was the first time I'd had the opportunity to learn English from English Speakers, and I met so many great people, and had so many great experiences. In the end, I felt I had to return to Aizu to be with my family, but I still wanted to be connected to the world.

In 1996, when I heard the International Association was

opening in Wakamatsu, I was immediately interested. At first, I was very active as a volunteer. I was a Language Volunteer, I helped at the International Festivals, and I was a regular at the Newsletter Preparation day. A few years later, I was lucky to get a position (not as the Gardener,) but as a Coordinator for International Relations. (I actually applied a few times, and like an

As long as there are two different people, you will experience some 'exchange.' about that. Even if you're not interested in going overseas or languages, I want people to know that if they go to the Association, they might 'connect' to something new.

An old staff once told me that it's important to have someone to be there to listen; foreign residents sometimes just need a listening ear to


